Mendip Closed Circuit TV System

The Mendip CCTV System was opened from a Control Room based in Wells in October 2003.

There had previously been locally run systems in several of the Mendip Towns, by the Local Councils, Frome, Glastonbury, Shepton Mallet and Street, supported by Monitoring by Community Volunteers.

The Government Grant secured in the late 1990s, enabled the installation of cameras in Wells and the expansion of the camera populations in the other four towns, with the consolidation of all monitoring in a centralised Control Room and the appointment of a Monitoring Office.

The 50 cameras across Mendip are supported by the five towns and Mendip District Council, The service largely supports the request for images, of incidents by the local police. Images are recorded and are retained for a certain number of days. It is important to remember, that if something happens, that needs reporting to the police or an insurance company, that the sooner this is done the better, as images are not retained for extended periods.

It is always important to remember that Mendip is a low crime area, but still there is a need to address some of the criminal activities that take place in our public space areas, covered by the cameras. The level of Incidents requests from the police peaked in 2007 and have since partially reduced to the current level of circa 350 per annum.

Since the opening of the Control Room the performance is reported each quarter to the Mendip CCTV User Group, where representatives of all the stakeholders, the five towns, MDC and the Police meet. These meetings cover the latest Statistics and any other related issues that the Members wish to raise and discuss.

The tradition of Community Volunteers, supporting the Monitor Officer still continues and new volunteers are welcome to apply. This requires an Application and a formal vetting via the Disclosure Barring Service (DBS). Rode Neighbourhood Plan

The Rode Neighbourhood Plan was "made" by Mendip District Council's Cabinet at its meeting on 7th August. That means that the plan is formally part of the Development Plan for the area and will be used to help determine planning applications.

Villagers voted 80% for, 20% against the plan at the referendum which was held on 18th July 2017.

The Parish Council has consulted widely on the plan with residents, businesses and a range of interest groups during its production.

The document was also considered by an independent examiner.

Mendip's Local Plan sets out the overall development strategy for the district, including housing numbers and broad locations, whilst the Neighbourhood Plan looks in more detail at Rode. It contains local objectives and policies for the village, including protecting its character and heritage, design requirements for new building, public open spaces and housing needs. It is a powerful tool shaping the area.

Collective Energy Switching

Collective Energy Switching is when consumers get together to negotiate a group deal with gas and electricity suppliers, with a third party actively negotiating a better tariff on behalf of the group through an auction process.

The amount saved will vary, but in previous rounds of energy switching that involved Mendip residents, people who signed up to the scheme saved an average of £205.88 on their annual fuel bills.

The Big Community Switch, which is open to all Mendip residents, aims to help prevent people slipping into fuel poverty by making easier and more convenient for people to participate in energy switching.

The way the process works is:

- Residents visit iChoosr's Big Community Switch website <u>www.bigcommunityswitch.com</u> where they can follow a simple online process to register their interest.
- Up to five households can be registered on one email address and residents without internet access will be supported through the registration process by the council.
- Mendip residents are then pooled with other local authority schemes (around 60 currently)
 and energy companies bid against each other in a reverse auction to offer the group of
 customers the best deal.
- A no-obligation offer is then sent to each resident who has registered in the scheme and they have a month to choose whether to accept it.
- If residents choose to accept their offer they are then switched to the new supplier and supported to ensure a smooth and hassle-free transfer.

Residents who wish to take part in the next round of energy switching need to have registered by 9 October 2017.

Mendip District Council has partnered with iChoosr, a leading expert in collective energy switching, to operate the scheme in the district.

Community Funding

THE AVIVA COMMUNITY FUND

Grants up to £25,000 for not-for-profit groups in the UK for projects that make a real difference in their local community (programme opens to applications on 12 September with a 10 October deadline)

Insurance company <u>Aviva</u> is making over £1.5 million available to support not-for-profit groups in the United Kingdom to deliver projects that will make a difference within their local community.

The <u>Aviva Community Fund</u> operates as a competition with the most-voted for projects receiving funding or going forward to a judging panel, depending on the amount of funding requested (i.e. with the exception of awards of £1,000, securing the most number of votes doesn't guarantee a grant award - that's up to the judging panel).

All applicants are encouraged to widely promote their projects and gather as much support from their local community as possible.

The most-voted for projects asking for up to £1,000 will secure their funding. The projects with the most votes asking for up to £5,000 or more will go through to the Finals and be judged by Aviva's judging panel.



In 2017, the awards will be given out in the following categories:

- **1. Health and Wellbeing** projects related to helping people take control of their physical and mental health. These could include anything from walking clubs to reduce loneliness, improving playgrounds and sports clubs and associations to community centres running well-being initiatives;
- **2. Skills for Life** projects that aim to help communities and individuals improve their lives by learning useful new skills, particularly digital skills. Projects in this category can help people of all ages develop abilities to make their lives easier or more fulfilling. This could include budget training for families, job skills or getting up to speed with new technology.
- **3. Inclusivity** these projects will recognise that successful communities value all people, acknowledging that every person adds something to the whole, and work to develop closer ties within the community, such as multi-faith education, accessibility improvements and community integration programmes; and
- **4. Community Support** these should be projects that are important to the wider community. They can be anything from regeneration projects to local support groups, or community events. This category aims to help communities make their surroundings and aspects of their life sustainable.

PLEASE NOTE: projects should be underway by December 2017 and, ideally (although this isn't essential), completed by 31 December 2018.

Voluntary and community groups, charities, social enterprises, Community Interest Companies, and faith organisations (for projects that are not solely religious and are open to the wider community) are eligible to apply.

Eligible applicants must:

- o Have been in existence for at least 6 months;
- o Be a not-for-profit organisation or group for community good;
- o Be able to meet the due diligence requirements; and
- o Have an income of £1 million or less.

In 2017, there are 4 funding levels:

- 1. 380 awards of up to £1,000;
- 2. 40 awards of up to £5,000;
- 3. 20 awards of up to £10,000; and
- 4. 8 awards of up to £25,000.

Projects that do not need additional funding will have a better chance than of succeeding than those relying on other funds being secured.

Entries will be accepted from 9am on Tuesday 12 September to midday on Tuesday 10 October 2017.

Other significant dates are:

- o Tuesday 24 October to Tuesday 21 November Public Vote;
- o Tuesday 28 November finalists announced; and
- o Tuesday 16 January winners announced.

Applicants are required to register on the Aviva website before they can submit a project to the competition.



Applicants are encouraged to add videos (which must be hosted on YouTube) and photos to their project submission to paint a better picture for the public.

The public will be able to vote for their favourite projects.

THE RON PICKERING MEMORIAL GRANTS

Micro-grants for young athletes aged 15-23 in Great Britain to help with training and equipment costs

The main purpose of the <u>Ron Pickering Fund</u> is to provide financial support for talented young athletes in Great Britain aged between 15 and 23 (grants for athletes aged over 23 can be made in exceptional circumstances), ideally while they are still in education.

The Fund is designed to assist young athletes with their training and equipment costs. and encourage them to continue participating in sport in order that they can reach their potential and learn the ethic of fair play.

Grants range in value depending on the athlete's age, ability and personal circumstances but have always had an impact on the athlete's ability to develop with a view to helping recipients make the difficult transition from junior to senior level through support for equipment, specialist coaching or travel and importantly help build the athlete's confidence and self esteem through recognition.

Previous recipients have included Greg Rutherford, Denise Lewis and Mo Farah.

The charity also assists coaches, athletic clubs and the Schools Athletics Associations and in the past has supported the development of Sportshall Athletics around the UK in order to Introduce more young children to athletics.

There is no minimum or maximum grant award level for this fund, although allocations are generally less than £500.

While there is broadly a 50% success rate, the average grant during the last financial year was just £200.

During the year ending 31 July 2016 the Fund there were in excess of 470 applications of which £44,600 was awarded to a total of 221 successful athletes from 119 clubs.

Match funding is not required.



Applications to the 2018 programme will open in September 2017 for decisions made in January 2018.

An application form will available to complete online at the Fund's website once the programme opens.
