

## Guide to using the Mendip Landscape Character Assessment 2020 website

### Introduction

The Council is inviting views on its revised Landscape Character Assessment. This study divides the district into 8 main landscape areas and 56 individual character areas. The maps of these areas, as well as a wealth of further information relating to the landscape of Mendip, can be viewed on the [Landscape Character Assessment](#) website.

The information below is to assist you in navigating the website. It sets out what information you can find out about a specific location and how exactly you go about collecting it. Details of how to respond to the consultation are also set out to help you when making your comments.

### What can the Landscape Character Assessment tell me about a specific location?

There are a number of things you can find out about a specific location. These are set out below.

#### 1. How to find the character area of a place or settlement

Click on the [character area map](#) on the homepage. The map automatically appears with the 56 character areas highlighted. To view the underlying OS map, click on the boxes to the right of the map.

- Find the location on the map.
- Click on the coloured section covering that location and an information box will appear. This will tell you:
  - the character area it is in (e.g. E1.1: Whitelake Valley - Evercreech Setting)
  - the type of landscape it is in (e.g. Lias Lowlands and Ridges)
- Click on the link (i.e. the landscape area) and it will take you to the relevant chapter in the report. Here you can find out lots of information about the landscape and character area of your location. This includes a table setting out the key characteristics of your character area under the following headings:
  - physical/natural characteristics
  - settlement and infrastructure
  - land use/management/human influences
  - perceived characteristics
  - special features
  - landmarks, views and viewpoints

Further information about the landscape type and character area of your location can be found by:

- Clicking on 'Landscape Types and Character Areas' in the left hand menu and selecting the landscape type that your area is in (e.g. Lias Lowlands and Ridges).
- Clicking on the relevant 'Read More' button - a new document will appear. This contains lots of maps with information on the following:
  - geology
  - topography
  - drainage
  - settlements and major infrastructure
  - national assets and landscape designations

- historic, cultural heritage and landscape designations
- other environmental designations
- stewardship schemes
- sustrans and long distance paths
- tranquillity
- dark skies

The revised information in the landscape character study can be used together with formal landscape designations and those in the adopted Local Plan. These include Mendip's two areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, the identified Special Landscape Features (in the Part 1 plan) and historic parks and gardens.

## 2. Changes from the previous study

The last full landscape assessment was undertaken in 1997. While many local areas are similar, there have been changes in boundaries and detail. The study includes a slider map which allows comparison from those in the adopted local plan . You can view this map by clicking [here](#).

## 3. National Landscape Character areas

The Mendip study fits into national framework of landscape character areas (NCA). This can also provide useful higher level background information and links to other datasets and studies . The study links to the national areas.

- Open the [National Character Area Profiles](#) webpage.
- In the contents on the left hand side of the NCA homepage, click on [NCAs in south west England](#).
- Click on the relevant national character area for your location – you can find this out by using the [comparison map](#). The NCAs covering Mendip are:

- Click on the link under 'Downloads available for this record' and a new document will appear containing lots of information including:
  - a description of the natural and cultural features that shape the landscape
  - how the landscape has changed over time
  - the current drivers for ongoing change
  - a broad analysis of the characteristics and ecosystem services of the area

## **Consultation to the end of November**

The Council is inviting views and comments on the Landscape Character Assessment. We would greatly value your local Knowledge and information to add or to check the detail . The consultants are also seeking views on it approach to what makes a ‘valued landscape’. This study is proposing [8 special characteristics](#) – see below. These characteristics will be used to help assess what is ‘valued landscape’ and should be taken into account in future plans and development decisions. The characteristics are

- A valuable collection of distinct and interesting landscapes
- Geology and geomorphology
- Biodiversity potential
- History
- Continuous landscape
- Tranquil, isolated and semi-natural landscape resource
- Views and landmarks
- Rich cultural heritage and recreational resource
